- a. Annotate your physical copy of the book. Feel free to use highlighters, sticky notes, and/or write in the margins. You will turn in the annotated copy of your book at the beginning of the school year.

When annotating, look for quotes or passages that do the following:

develop characterization

- include significant use of literary devices (ie. metaphor/simile, imagery, etc.) that further meaning
- develop theme
- grab your attention based on content/construction, etc.
- b. Submit <u>two</u> discussion posts to Google Classroom. For each discussion post, you must write at least <u>five</u> sentences analyzing a quote from your novel. Avoid plot summary. Focus on analysis and revealing what the text says implicitly.
- c. In addition to your discussion posts, you must also respond to two other students on Google Classroom. Your comment must include a new insight, not just tell students you like what they wrote.
- d. First Discussion Post and Comment Due 11:59 pm Friday, July 5 Second Discussion Post and Comment Due - 11:59 pm Monday, August 5
- e. On the first day of school, Monday, August 12, you must bring in a typed, double-spaced paper responding to the following:
  - Identify a single, pivotal moment in the moral or psychological development of the protagonist. What moment would you choose, and why is it significant? Your response to this must be at least two full paragraphs.
  - Identify what you imagine would be the meaning of the work as a whole. This **must** be a complete thematic statement or sentence. The meaning of the work as a whole or theme will **never** be just one word.
